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MYSTERY OF MEDALS IN MACHYNLLETH

Miss Lis Puw, newly appointed to Ysgol Bro Ddyfi, Machynlleth, has discovered medals in a desk at the school. Why the medals of two servicemen, one from the First World War and one from the Second World War should have been left at the school is a mystery but some information has come to light on the two servicemen to whom they were awarded.

The soldier from the First World War was Lt. Cpl. T. Davies, service number 428278, of the Canadian Infantry. His medals are the Distinguished Conduct Medal and his Canadian Infantry Service Medal. David Wyn Davies of Machynlleth has traced this soldier to his birthplace in Penegoes in either 1891 or 1892 and has found that he moved within a couple of months with his parents to Machynlleth. It is believed that the family lived at Garden Village for a short time and later lived at Maengwyn, Aberystwyth. An old newspaper cutting relating to Lt.Cpl. T.O. Davies describes how his battalion, who had served in Ypres, Belgium had been practically wiped out during a massed attack by the German forces on June 3rd, 1916. Lt. Cpl. Davies left the trenches and bought wounded men back from No man's Land while under fire from German Artillery and machine guns. It may be that Lt. Cpl. Davies and his family emigrated to Canada before the First World War but it may be that he simply joined the Canadian Infantry, apparently by no means an unusual occurrence.

It was recognised during the Crimean War that there was a need for a gallantry medal for other ranks. Since, 1916, the DCM has been regarded as superior to the Military Medal and is the second highest award for gallantry in a action after the

Victoria Cross. There is much to be discovered and clarified about Lt. Cpl. Davies but what is clear is that he survived the war as his name does not appear on the lists of Commonwealth dead.

The other medals found at the school, the 1939-1945 Star and the 1939-1945 Air Crew Europe Star, belong to a young man who served in the Second World War and whose name, sadly, is listed among the dead for that conflict. Sergeant (Pilot) Robin Aelred Attwater, service number 1264198, died on 7th July 1940 at the age of twenty. He is listed as being the son of Donald and Dorothy Attwater, St. Ives, Cornwall, on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission site but the box which held his medals was addressed to D. Attwater, 21 High Street, Petersfield, Hampshire and then to Raglan, Wales. Sgt. (Pilot) Attwater was buried at Lorient (Kerentrech) Communal Cemetery. Lorient is a town, seaport and naval base with government dockyards and arsenal and is situated on the south coast of Brittany. He served with 156 squadron which had been formed in the First World War and was re-formed in August 1942 as part of the Pathfinder Force, making bombing effective by dropping incendiary bombs and flares from the aircraft. The motto of this squadron is "We light the way." At first flying Wellingtons and converting to Lancasters in 1943, 156 squadron played a major part in Bomber Command's offensive. The squadron suffered heavy losses while flying Wellingtons and the Air Crew Star medal which was awarded to Sgt.(Pilot) Attwater was awarded for operational flights over Europe from bases in the UK. If the recipient had their service ended because of death or injury, as was the case with Sgt. (Pilot) Attwater, the Star was awarded regardless of the length of service which

would normally have been two months' service. (The 1939-1945 Star was awarded for six months service on active operations for the Army and the Navy and two months service for active crew between 2 September 1939 and 8 May 1945 (Europe) or 2 September (Pacific). This difference reflects the heightened danger to air crews). We can conclude that Sgt. (Pilot) Attwater was killed while flying a Wellington over Brittany.

It remains a mystery as to how these medals came to be in a desk in a school at Machynlleth but we hope that some day, we will have an answer.

A REMARKABLE FIND AT NEWTOWN HIGH SCHOOL

Some months ago, in the back of a storeroom at Newtown High School, a pile of twenty-eight wooden boxes were found. They contained hundreds of glass plate photographic negatives. Examination of them revealed that they had been taken by the late J B Willians of Dolforgan, Kerry in the early years of the twentieth century. After extensive work by local historians many of the pictures were identified. They fall into four categories: pictures Mr Willians took of his friends and family in and around Dolforgan Hall, photographs of properties on his estate around Kerry, taken on Mr Willians' extensive tours on the Continent, and a remarkable collection of pictures of the notable buildings and churches of Montgomeryshire which he took at the request of the Powysland Club. Newtown High School quickly realised that this was a collection of some importance so they asked the National Library of Wales to take charge of it. The Library quickly agreed and the plates, still in their boxes are now in their care.

Anyone wishing to know more of this exciting collection is invited to an illustrated talk organised by Newtown Civic Society in Newtown Congregational School room at 7pm on Wednesday 14th September.

The holiday season saw an increase in the number of local and family history enquiries. Most of them

could be answered from the Census Returns or the Memorial Inscription/baptism/marriage booklets produced by the genealogical societies. We hold indexes on microfiche for the 1841, 1851 & 1881 Montgomeryshire Returns. Using these indexes can save a lot of time trawling through various parishes looking for someone. We also have a selection of Trade Directories (1822 – 1936) on fiche. They are a useful resource both for family history and local history.

A member of staff sometimes fields questions on the website www.askcymru.org.uk/ - The Blue Book featured recently in one such enquiry. The Blue Book was published in 1847. It was a damning report on the state of education in Wales at that time and two volumes of it sit in our Local Studies Room.

The BBC have been researching for a radio programme on accents and dialects. They contacted me hoping I could give them names of local people running market stalls in Welshpool on a Monday. I don't know if they found many as I only came up with the name of one person from the area. Most of the stallholders hail from the Manchester area.

An interesting enquiry came from someone wanting to obtain an up to date map of Newtown town centre and details of which business is operating from each shop premises. He wants to put the information on a website. By using a 3D effect anyone browsing on the website will be able to take a virtual walk through the streets of the town.

And finally, I have seen a copy of a 1902 birth certificate with the birthplace given as Lime Tree Terrace, Newtown. I can't find any record of it anywhere. I would welcome any information on the subject.

GWYL PETER WARLOCK FESTIVAL

Montgomery Civic Society is holding a Festival to mark the 75th anniversary of the death of Peter Warlock (Philip Heseltine, 1894-1930) in December 2005. Widely regarded as the composer of some of the finest British songs and choral music of the twentieth century, Warlock is also remembered for his famous friendships (D. H. Lawrence, W. B. Yeats and Aleister Crowley) and eccentric hobbies (keeping rare breeds of cat, Cossack dancing on railway stations, and motor-biking in the nude).

Although Warlock was born in London's Savoy Hotel, he had close family links with mid Wales. His mother Edith, *née* Covernton, grew up in Knighton and settled in Llandyssil following her second marriage to Walter Buckley-Jones, squire of Cefnbryntalch Hall, in 1903. Warlock loved the Montgomeryshire countryside, taught himself Welsh and other Celtic languages, and completed much of his most significant music and musical scholarship while living more or less permanently at the Hall between 1921 and 1924, and again in 1928. Bela Bartók, the Hungarian composer and pianist, visited Warlock at Cefnbryntalch in 1922 after giving a recital at Aberystwyth University which

Professor Walford Davies described to the *Cambrian News* as 'baffling!'

Warlock sometimes deputised for the organist at Llandyssil Church and was a regular visitor to Montgomery. He once holed up with the notorious Dr Dick Phillips, who lived in the Governor's residence at the former County Gaol, and they polished off a case of whisky between them. Emerging several days later for a breath of air on Castle Rock, Warlock broke his leg in the mistaken belief that he could fly from the battlements. Mrs Buckley-Jones was not impressed when she opened her front door to be greeted by the sight of her son's leg in plaster, sticking out of the doctor's car window. A letter written by Warlock in April 1924 confirms the unfortunate consequence of his 'too too Dionysian prance down the steep slopes of Montgomery Castle'.

The *Gwyl Peter Warlock Festival* takes place between 16 and 18 December 2005 in many more of the historic Montgomery buildings which Warlock himself knew, including the recently-refurbished Georgian Town Hall and the Church of St Nicholas. As with the first Warlock Festival in 2002, the programme has been devised by Dr Rhian Davies and she will deliver Montgomery Civic Society's annual Christmas lecture on the subject of *Peter Warlock in Montgomeryshire* (Friday, 16 December, 7.30pm). Rhian's Warlock research began in the Local History Collection of Newtown Library in 1993 and won the Powys County Library Service's Creative Writing Competition the following year. Her work has since taken her to the USA, Canada, South Africa and Australia and she will talk about her latest discoveries as well as showing rare photographs to be published shortly in her *Illustrated Life of Peter Warlock*.

Saturday begins with a walking tour of Warlockian sites and the official opening of the Festival exhibition in the Old Bell Museum. Then, at 11.30am - 75 years after Warlock was pronounced dead on 17 December 1930 - the distinguished Home Office pathologist, Professor Bernard Knight, will reexamine the evidence surrounding the discovery of the composer's body in his gas-filled Chelsea flat (*Peter Warlock's death: a mystery or*

not?). Also on Saturday, John Worthen, Emeritus Professor of D. H. Lawrence Studies at the University of Nottingham, considers Warlock as the model for Halliday in Lawrence's *Women in Love*, and Dr Brian Collins discusses the composer's Christmas music.

The Saturday evening concert (7.30pm) is given by the outstanding young British tenor Andrew Kennedy, making his first major appearance in Wales since winning the Rosenblatt Recital Prize at this year's *BBC Cardiff Singer of the World*. Andrew is a truly exciting artist destined for a meteoric international career and the Festival is fortunate indeed that he and his accompanist Simon Crawford-Phillips are free to perform on the day of the 75th anniversary itself.

Sunday, 18 December, includes a reconstruction of one of the choral services at which Warlock 'presided at the grand organ' in 1921; a workshop for young singers directed by Michael Pilkington; Professor M. Wynn Thomas on the creative writing of Warlock's son (*Nigel Heseltine: forgotten border writer*); and a programme of Christmas music and readings, featuring performances of Warlock's

carols by Guilsfield Singers.

Festival flyers will be available in the autumn with updates on the Civic Society website (www.oldbellmuseum.org.uk) and in the local press. Please book early to make sure of tickets as demand is expected to be high for this unique event.
